Their narratives reflected resilience, determination, and the positive change brought by focused skill development initiatives. COO, JSLPS, Shri Bishnu C Parida, COO, DDU-GKY Shri Rakesh Kumar and senior officials of JSLPS were present in the event.



A Journey Through Change: Additional Secretary T.K. Anil Kumar Witnesses Rural Livelihood Transformation in Jharkhand



Mr. T.K. Anil Kumar, Additional Secretary of the Ministry of Rural Development, Government of India, embarked on a two-day visit to Jharkhand to assess and understand the on-ground progress of initiatives under the DAY-NRLM.

On day one, he visited Takpara village in Torpa block in Khunti district. In Tapkara, he visited the Sankul Sangathan Pvt. Ltd., a community-owned enterprise, where women greeted him with traditional hospitality. He then explored the Livelihood Resource Centre in Gathjora village. The center showcased progressive farming practices such as cultivation of chili, strawberry, pineapple, banana, and dragon fruit, alongside poultry, duck rearing, and egg production. He also interacted with women of the SHGs.

The visit also included a walkthrough of Palash-branded handicraft stalls, particularly those by “Aadiva”, featuring indigenous jewelry crafted by tribal women. Mr. Kumar also witnessed live demonstrations of mobile application-based innovations introduced for various rural cadre roles, including Aajeevika Pashu Sakhi, Bagwani Sakhi and Krishi Sakhi. Later, at the JSLPS state office in Ranchi, he participated in discussions around the implementation of LokOS, a key monitoring platform, addressing its progress and system-level challenges. He also reviewed the initiatives under the Palash brand, designed to promote rural products. During his interactions, Mr. Kumar stressed the

importance of digital platforms, artificial intelligence (AI), and cross-learning mechanisms in amplifying the impact of rural development initiatives. He remarked that the integration of such tools could significantly empower rural communities, laying a strong foundation for sustainable and inclusive growth. On the second day, Mr. Kumar visited the Palash Uttam Agro Processing Centre in Kattermali, Ranchi district. He was joined by Mr. K. Shrinivasan, Secretary, Rural Development Department, Government of Jharkhand, Ms. Kanchan Singh, CEO of JSLPS, and other senior officials. He took a detailed tour of the processing center. Runa, the processing in-charge, explained the procedures involved in dal, gram flour, and spice processing and packaging, while Jaya, the center in-charge, spoke about the end-to-end participation of women’s groups—from sourcing raw materials to marketing the finished goods. The team showcased records of production, data entries in the Khata app, marketing strategies, and sales performance. A progress report was also presented during the CLF meeting, where women from different rural cadre roles shared their personal experiences and impact stories. In addition to this, Mr. Kumar visited a DDU-GKY training center, where he directly interacted with youth undergoing skill training under the Deen Dayal Upadhyay Grameen Kaushalya Yojana. He emphasized that by embracing digital innovation and AI, rural societies can become more empowered, self-reliant, and resilient — ushering in a new era of grassroots-led progress.



Empowering Rural Women: From Traditional Farmer to Lakhpati Didi

Kavita Devi earns more than Rs 1.5 lakh in a year by selling potatoes, cauliflower and wheat

Kavita Devi lives at Sikardih village in Palojori Block in Deoghar. In 2017, she joined Maa Mansha Self-Help Group (SHG), where she started discussing daily challenges and new ideas with other women of her village and nearby villages as well. This platform proved to be a turning point in her life. Earlier, Kavita and her family were engaged in traditional farming, but the output was very low and income was also uncertain. Through the SHG, she got the opportunity to learn about advanced agricultural techniques. With the

help of time-to-time training and high-quality seeds received under convergence, she upgraded her farming practices and started cultivating crops like cucumber, chillis, watermelon, maize and wheat on a larger scale. Whenever required, she also took loans through her SHG to support her farming activities. Kavita didn't stop there and took further training and learned the SRI (System of Rice Intensification) technique for rice cultivation. After treating the seeds properly, she saw better yields and increased profit. Now, she is doing farming on 3 acres of land and earns from seasonal vegetables as well. Just from potatoes, cauliflower, and wheat, she earned more than ₹1.5 lakh in a year, making her a proud Lakhpati Didi. Besides farming, Kavita also works as a Block Resource Person (BRP), helping other women learn and adopt better livelihood practices. Her journey from a traditional farmer to a skilled cultivator shows how access to knowledge, credit, and community support can transform rural lives.

Poultry to Prosperity: The Inspiring Journey of a 'Lakhpati Didi'

A resident of Asansol village under Sadar Block of Dumka, Poonam Devi began her livelihood journey under JSLPS. In 2020, she started poultry farming to supplement her income. Since then, she has successfully completed 25 cycles of chick hardening at her own hardening center, rearing a total of 18,750 chicks. She operates 5 to 6 cycles every year, and each cycle brings her an estimated income of Rs13000 to 15,000. So far, she has earned approximately ₹1.71 lakh solely from poultry hardening. Besides that, she cultivates paddy and mustard, which further adds to her income. Building on her success, Poonam has now launched a new poultry farm with a capacity to rear 3,000 chicks. At present, she is raising 5,000 chicks of BV-380 breed. She maintains systematic records of her operations. Women of her village frequently approach her to learn chick care, vaccination, deworming and shed construction. Many of the SHG members, she has trained, are now running their own poultry businesses and becoming self-reliant. Her journey not only brought her financial independence but also

strengthened her self-confidence and belief in her own capabilities.

She plans to expand her hardening center further. Now, she wishes to introduce advanced infrastructure to increase chick capacity in her poultry farm where she will raise improved broiler breeds for higher productivity. She envisions promoting poultry farming across Dumka, creating more livelihood opportunities for rural women.

Crafting a Better Life with SHG's support

Latehar



By adopting modern techniques of farming, Binita's annual income increased up to Rs 1 lakh

Binita Devi, a resident of Mangra village in Latehar, had been facing severe financial challenges before joining the local women's self-help group. Her family's condition was poor, and even basic household expenses were difficult to manage. Despite working hard, her income was not enough to support the family. After becoming a member of SHG, Binita was selected as an Aajeevika Krishi Sakhi (AKS). Through

JSLPS, she received training in farming and started making preparations for agricultural work. She first took a small loan from the group to improve her home and later borrowed ₹70,000 to invest in farming.

With the help and guidance provided by Livelihood-Community Resource Person (LH-CRP), she started farming with more confidence. Slowly, her efforts started showing results. Her farming activities improved, and her income also increased significantly. This brought positive changes to her family life and she started repaying the loan. So far, she has already returned ₹40,000. With the loan amount, Binita purchased materials for machan (trellis) farming and adopted organic farming techniques. This method proved to be quite profitable and she was able to grow two types of crops in the same space, which impressed the group members. Earlier, there were no proper irrigation system at her farm, but now, she owns a borewell and a motor pump. Today, with an annual income of more than Rs 1 lakh, her family's condition has improved a lot. She is no longer dependent on anyone else for support and her family is happy.

Empowered by PJAA, Kalawati rewrites her destiny

Kalawati Mohalin, a resident of Balardih village in Purbi Tundi block of Dhanbad, was once struggling to sustain her family of four. With her husband working as a migrant labourer and her in-laws unable to support household chores, Kalawati was compelled to sell 'hadia' (rice beer) and handmade bamboo products. Besides providing minimal income, the social stigma of selling hadia also brought disrespect and isolation to the family. Neighbours used to avoid the family, and the constant presence of drunk customers deeply affected her children's upbringing and living environment. Everything started changing when she joined Lakhi SHG in 2017, under Balardih VO supported by JSLPS. Through regular meetings, Kalawati learned about savings, loans, and ultimately decided to stop liquor trade. With an interest free loan of ₹10,000 under the Phulo Jhano Ashirwad Abhiyan (PJAA), she started a poultry business, restoring

dignity and peace to her household.

Today, Kalawati is planning to expand her poultry business further into goat and duck rearing and intends to purchase a cart. Her home now echoes with school lessons of her children and she stands as a symbol of empowerment, having reclaimed her identity with pride and self-respect. Her current annual income is Rs 1.5 lakh, making her capable of providing a peaceful and happy life for her family.

Kiran Devi's journey from a struggling farmer to 'Lakhpati Didi'

Kiran Devi lives at Satanpur village under Chas Block in Bokaro. Life wasn't easy for her since beginning as her family was dependent fully on farming of vegetables like tomato, brinjal, sponge gourd, ridge gourd and bitter gourd. But due to lack of quality seeds, fertilizers and unpredictable weather, they couldn't earn much. The family's income was very low and

expenses were often unmet.

But things started changing after December 2019, when Kiran joined the Aajeevika Self-Help Group under JSLPS. A year later, she received ₹1,00,000 as Community Investment Fund (CIF) through her group. She used this wisely to test her soil, buy high-quality seeds, and adopt better farming methods. Kiran didn't stop there and in 2024–25, she set up a drip irrigation system on her land with the help from JSLPS. She also received Gladiolus flower seeds from the Horticulture Department and began growing flowers on 30–35 decimal of her land. These beautiful flowers were in high demand and in her first season itself, she earned ₹8,000–10,000. Over the time, she made a total profit of ₹50,000 from flower farming alone. With her hard work and smart planning, Kiran now earns over ₹1,10,000 annually and is proudly known as a 'Lakhpati Didi'. She also grows various vegetables and fruits using seeds provided by JSLPS and the Agriculture Department like sponge gourd, brinjal, coriander, beans, papaya, and more flowers.

Kiran Devi's journey is a shining example and is inspiring many other women in her village to take charge of their livelihoods and become self-reliant.

A journey of self reliance through farming

Sumitra Devi, a resident of T. Tangar village in Simdega, started her journey towards self-reliance in 2017 by joining the Beli Aajeevika Self-Help Group. Initially, she used to cultivate vegetables on a small patch of land, which provided only minimal income. To make matters worse, her family's main farmland had been mortgaged, pushing them further into financial hardships. After joining the SHG, Sumitra received training on vegetable cultivation from RSETI, which renewed her confidence and skills as well. She also availed a loan of ₹50,000 from the Community Investment Fund provided through her SHG. The first thing she did was reclaim her mortgaged land and then she started vegetable farming on a larger scale. Thanks to her hard work and commitment; her production increased significantly, leading to improved earnings. Currently, Sumitra has taken an additional 3 acres of land on lease for seasonal vegetable cultivation. Her farm now yields crops like chili, cucumber, watermelon, pumpkin, bitter gourd

and kucchu (a local vegetable). She has also started employing other SHG members like Deepika Devi, providing them with daily wage work on her farm.

Sumitra now earns between ₹1 lakh to ₹1.5 lakh annually through agriculture. Her efforts have not only brought her financial stability but have also boosted her confidence and status in the community. By generating employment for other women, she has become a symbol of empowerment in her village. Looking ahead, Sumitra aspires to become a wholesale supplier of seasonal vegetables, further expanding her enterprise and bringing more women into the fold of economic independence.

Cultivating Change with Sunflower Farming

In the Chitakuri Village in Fatehpur Block of Jamtara, where farming once felt like a distant hope and land remained untouched for years, a group of determined women from the Jaba Baha Self-Help Group under JSLPS chose to rewrite their story through an unexpected path—floriculture. What once started as a shared dream among women farmers turned into a reality. With limited income from maize and vegetables, the 12 women of SHG decided to take a

bold step—cultivating sunflowers on 3 acres of barren land. There was a risk, but there was also a possibility, they were willing to fight for.

Supported by JSLPS, they received the KBSH-78 variety seeds, essential inputs like fertilizers and regular technical training. Despite water scarcity, the group members cleaned a traditional well to irrigate their fields. They mobilized resources by taking loan from SHG. In just 80–90 days, vibrant yellow sunflowers painted the once-barren land, yielding 6–8 quintals per acre. With an estimated income of more than Rs 1 lakh, the floriculture initiative became more than a livelihood, it became a movement of hope. "I never thought our land could bloom like this. Today, when I walk through the sunflower fields, I feel proud, not just for myself, but for all the women who believed in their dreams," says Anita Hembrom. The women of Jaba Baha SHG have not only turned unused land into a canvas of yellow blossom, but have also sown seeds of confidence, leadership and collective prosperity in their community.

BC Sakhi : Bringing Banking to Doorsteps

Meena Kumari Char lives in Badiya More of Palojori Block in Deoghar. She is a member of Saraswati Sakhi Mandal. Like many women in rural areas, Meena once had limited opportunities. But today, she is making a big difference in her village as a Banking Correspondent Sakhi (BC Sakhi) and a Common Service Center (CSC) operator. Since 2023, Meena has been working as a BC Sakhi, providing essential banking services to people. She helps villagers with cash withdrawal, deposit, balance enquiry, and even fills out government forms like Maiyaan Samman Yojana, Old Age Pension, PMJJBY etc... especially for the women and elderly who find it difficult to visit banks. She also provides doorstep services to the needy ones. Every month, Meena handles around 600 to 1000 transactions, with a total amount of ₹10–12 lakh. Through her dedication, she earns about ₹15,000 to ₹20,000 per month which is helping her support her family and building her own identity.

Meena runs her CSC center from home, while her

husband runs a nearby computer training center, making it a family effort to promote digital awareness in the village. Meena's journey from a rural homemaker to a tech-enabled rural entrepreneur shows how women can lead the way in financial inclusion and digital empowerment. Her work as a BC Sakhi is not just a job, it's a mission to bring banking within everyone's reach, especially in hard-to-access areas.

Women-Led Enterprises Empowering Rural Economies

Priyanka Devi is a resident of Bankheta village in Chainpur Block in Palamu. Today, she is earning lakhs of rupees through her cheese business while empowering other women also by providing training to them in the same trade. A member of the Jagrati Mahila Self Help Group, Priyanka has emerged as one of the district's proud Lakhpati Didis.

Priyanka initially learned the art of making paneer from her husband, Sachidanand Pandey, who used to run a small-scale cheese business. However, the income generated through it was too little to sustain their family. Determined to improve their condition, Priyanka took a loan of ₹1.5 lakh through her SHG and an additional ₹50,000 through the PMFME scheme to expand her venture. Today, she produces and sells 60–70 kg of cheese every day at ₹300 per kg. She has expanded her business across Palamu, Garhwa and Latehar districts. As her annual income now exceeds Rs 2.5 lakh, she manages her household efficiently, supports her children's education and leads a life of dignity and independence. Besides her own success, Priyanka is also training other women in her village, paving the way for collective empowerment. She dreams of seeing her children become successful officers one day. Her journey stands as a shining example of rural entrepreneurship, women's empowerment and resilience.

Stitching a New Identity with Self-Reliance

Radhika Mahto, from Kandra village in Gamharia Block of Seraikela-Kharsawan district, has created a strong personal identity and achieved financial independence through her involvement in SHGs. She is an active member and plays a key role in the "Kandra Badha Dumri Aajeevika Mahila Gram Sangathan," which includes 21 SHGs. She joined the group in 2018, during a time when her family was struggling financially. Her husband worked in a small private company and managing household expenses was a daily challenge.

With the support from Maa Kali Aajeevika Sakhi Mandal, Radhika initially took a small loan of ₹2,000 to start tailoring business from home. After repaying this loan successfully, she availed ₹50,000 from the Gram Sangathan to expand her livelihood and opened a tailoring shop in the local market. Her shop has gained popularity, attracting customers from nearby

villages who trust her work and reasonable pricing. She is especially known for her skilled blouse tailoring. Today, Radhika earns more than 1lakh rupees annually. Beyond her economic progress, Radhika is also actively engaged in local social work and gender awareness. She is widely respected in her community for her efforts and leadership.

Notably, ragi-based products like laddoos, mixtures, and papad by Bridgit Kandulna of Kolebira Block's Maa Baghchandi SHG were a major attraction. This success underscore the impact of JSLPS and the Rural Development Department in promoting women's empowerment and rural entrepreneurship.

Aajeevika Didi Café is a powerful initiative aimed at empowering rural women by providing economic independence while preserving Jharkhand's rich culinary heritage. Traditional dishes like Chawal Dumbo and Madua Dumbo are served here, keeping local flavors and culture alive. The consistent increase in the income of women's groups highlights the growing economic empowerment of rural women, which is a matter of



great pride. The Didi Café stands as an inspiring example of rural women's entrepreneurship, significantly contributing to the promotion of self-employment and socio-economic empowerment of women in Jharkhand.

Coordination Meeting



A state-level coordination meeting was held at the JSLPS State Office to strengthen SHG-Bank linkage and RSETI activities. Chaired by CEO, JSLPS, Mrs. Kanchan Singh, IAS, the meeting reviewed SHG credit linkage progress for FY 2024-25, outlined plans

for FY 2025-26, and discussed appointment of SHG women as Business Correspondents (BCs), claim settlements under PMSBY/PMJJBY, and facilitating personal loans under the Mudra scheme. RSETI performance, off-campus training, pending claims, and the Annual Action Plan were also addressed. District Program Managers and FI Managers participated virtually to highlight local issues. Mrs. Singh instructed banks to expedite credit linkage and involve Anganwadi workers in death reporting. She also emphasized developing IEC materials and monthly mobilization calendars for RSETIs. Key officials from JSLPS, SLBC, RBI, and RSETIs participated and shared key inputs to strengthen financial inclusion efforts.

CEO, JSLPS visited RSETI center

CEO, JSLPS, Mrs. Kanchan Singh, IAS, visited the RSETI Ranchi. During the visit, she provided several important guidelines for the smooth operation of RSETI centers. She instructed that training centers should operate regularly and all training programs should be completed within the stipulated time.
